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# 1 BACKGROUND

## 1.1 Legislative Base

A redistribution of the electoral boundaries for the Legislative Assembly is required to be conducted under section 13 of the *Northern Territory (Self-Government Act) 1978*, (the Self-Government Act) and section 138 of the *Electoral Act 2004* (the Act). Section 138 of the Act provides that a redistribution must be conducted as soon as practicable after two years and six months after the polling day for the last General Election, which was held on 18 June 2005.

## 1.2 Composition of Redistribution Committees

The redistribution is undertaken by the Redistribution Committee (RC) and the Augmented Redistribution Committee (ARC). The two committees are established and conducted in accordance with sections 331-343 of the Act.

The RC is comprised of three members, namely the Electoral Commissioner, who is the Chair, the Surveyor-General and the Auditor-General. The RC is required to invite public suggestions, seek comments on the suggestions, prepare and publish the proposed redistribution of electoral boundaries and invite objections to the redistribution.

The ARC is comprised of the members of the RC plus an appointed member who is the Chairperson. The ARC is required to consider all objections to the RC's report and make a final redistribution of the Territory into divisions.

## 1.3 Objects of Redistribution

The objects of a redistribution are set out at section 139 of the Act as follows:

- at the time of the next general election, the number of electors in each proposed division should be as near to equal as practicable;
- the physical area of each division containing rural and remote areas should be kept as small as practicable;
- the demographic and geographic nature of each division should be as uniform as practicable;
- identifiable communities should be included in only one division, if practicable;
- the names of existing divisions should not be changed unless an existing name is no longer appropriate;

- if a new name is proposed for a division, the use of locality names should be avoided; and
- subject to the above, changes to existing divisions should, as far as practicable, minimise the number of electors being transferred from one division to another.

#### **1.4 Matters to be Considered by the Committees**

Matters to be considered by the Committees during the redistribution process are set out in section 140 of the Act and section 13(4) of the Self-Government Act.

These sections require the Committees to ensure that each proposed division contains a number of electors not exceeding, or falling short of, the quota by 20%. The quota is calculated by dividing the total number of electors in the Territory by the number of divisions.

The Committees must also give proper consideration to the following matters for each of the proposed divisions:

- community of interests including economic, social and regional interests;
- types of communication and travel, with special reference to disabilities arising out of remoteness or distance;
- the trend of population changes in the Territory;
- the density of population;
- the area;
- the physical features;
- existing boundaries, including Territory and Commonwealth divisions, suburb, town and local government boundaries, legislated areas and regions of Aboriginal land interest; and
- all public suggestions and comments given under sections 141 and 142 of the Act.

#### **1.5 Redistribution Timetable**

The timetable for the 2008 Redistribution is shown at Appendix A.

The redistribution process is required to commence as soon as practicable after two years and six months after the polling day for the last general election. In accordance with section 141 of the Act, the 2008 redistribution commenced with an invitation for public submissions advertised in major NT newspapers on 19 December 2007. Following publication of the submissions, the RC sought comment from the public on the suggestions received.

In accordance with sections 143 and 144 of the Act, the RC prepared a proposed redistribution of the Territory into divisions and made maps and a report of the proposal available to the public on 24 April 2008. In accordance with section 145, a notice advising the availability of maps and inviting objections to the proposal was

published in NT newspapers at that time. The closing date for the receipt of objections was 26 May 2008.

After the close of objections, the ARC gave proper consideration to all objections and comments received and redistributed the Territory into divisions and published a declaration notice of the redistribution and the names and boundaries of the divisions in the *Gazette* on 16 June 2008. The new boundaries come into force at the next Legislative Assembly General Election following the *Gazette* notice.

## **1.6 Description of Boundaries**

The RC decided that the past practice of using technical descriptions to identify the proposed boundaries of divisions be discontinued and that they be provided solely as well defined maps. This change accords with recent practice in other jurisdictions.

The ARC agreed with the RC's decision to discontinue the use of technical descriptions and, accordingly, official boundaries for each division are shown on individual Compiled Plans (CPs) which are authorised by the Surveyor-General and referenced in the *Gazette* notice describing the redistribution.

## **1.7 The 2004 Redistribution Revisited**

As an initial step, the ARC familiarised itself with the reports of the 2004 Redistribution and Augmented Redistribution Committees. In particular, the ARC noted the previous Augmented Committee's comments where it observed that there was:

- a continuing move of population from rural to existing urban and surrounding areas;
- a consequential increase in the geographical size of the rural divisions to increase elector numbers within their boundaries;
- increasing difficulty in maintaining purely urban and non-urban divisions on the fringes of urban developments; and
- a need to continually move boundaries of the southern divisions northwards as a result of the population growth in Darwin, Palmerston and the nearby rural area.

The 2004 Augmented Redistribution Committee also commented that it found it impossible to satisfy all of the strong community of interest issues involved. Although that Committee opted for an approach that minimised boundary changes, it did foreshadow that growth pressures in some regions and anticipated declines elsewhere would necessitate major changes to boundaries at a future date.

The 2004 Committee's predictions as to population growth have been confirmed. At the commencement of the 2004 redistribution the average divergence from the quota was 4.9%. With rapid population growth over the succeeding four years,


particularly with the movement into the Top End, the average divergence from quota at 26 May 2008 was 7.4%, including seven divisions diverging from quota by 10% or more.

## 1.8 Calculation of Quota

No specific date is provided in either the Self-Government Act or the Act for the striking of the quota. The RC used electoral data showing elector numbers by division as at 14 February 2008. On that date there were 118 852 electors on the Northern Territory roll, including 257 provisional enrollees (17 year olds). The resultant quota at 14 February 2008 was 4754.

The ARC decided to use elector numbers at the closing date for objections on 26 May 2008 to determine the quota. At that date there were 119 153 electors on the Northern Territory roll including 114 provisional enrollees, giving a quota of 4766.

## 1.9 Key Issues Arising from Elector Growth and Imbalances

Since the last redistribution in September 2004, the quota has increased by 321 electors. This amounts to 7.2% over the period or approximately 1.8% per annum, a rate that is more than twice the growth that occurred between the 2000 and 2004 redistributions. Details of movement in enrolment and quota for the 2004 and 2008 redistribution are shown at Appendix B.

More significantly, the proportion of Territory electors enrolled in Darwin, Palmerston and the Top End generally has increased relative to the quota whilst enrolment in Alice Springs and the remote divisions of Stuart, Macdonnell and Barkly has declined against the quota. In a number of divisions there was an absolute decline in electors. It is this rapid and asymmetrical growth that has, and will continue to have, an impact on the redistribution process and outcomes.

There was an increase in the quota of 12 electors per division over the three months to 26 May 2008. Despite the modest increase in the quota over this period there were significant changes in enrolment for specific divisions. The three divisions covering Palmerston each increased by more than 1% of the quota and Fannie Bay increased by 0.9%. The divisions of Greatorex, Johnston, Macdonnell Stuart and Arnhem each declined by an average of 1% of quota over the three months to 26 May 2008.

### **1.10 Methodology Applied by the 2008 Augmented Committee**

In accordance with section 140(1) of the Act, both Committees must ensure that each proposed division contains a number of electors not exceeding, or falling short by, 20% of the quota mentioned at section 13(4) of the Self-Government Act.

The ARC examined the redistribution objects and considerations as set out in the Act and reviewed the approach taken by the RC in arriving at its proposed redistribution of boundaries.

The ARC noted the suggestions, comments and objections made to both Committees to the effect that no change or only minimal change to boundaries should take place. However, it reaffirmed the view set out in the *2008 Report on the Proposed Redistribution of the Northern Territory* that one of the key objectives of the redistribution is to ensure that the principle of one vote/one value be maintained so that at the time of the next general election the number of electors in each division should be as near to equal as practicable.

However, in examining the issue of community of interest raised in objections, the ARC was prepared to consider a modest widening of the variations against the quota which were contained in the RC's proposal.

The ARC agreed that the alignment of divisions with municipal boundaries was appropriate as urban centres represent a strong community of interest. At this redistribution complete quotas could be found in Darwin, Palmerston, Katherine and Alice Springs thus avoiding the need to extend the boundaries of town divisions outside the municipal boundaries. However, it is unlikely this coincidence will be maintained at the next redistribution.

To assist in the review of the RC's proposal and to give some context to the written objections, the ARC undertook consultations with interested parties. The availability of the ARC for consultation by appointment was widely advertised and the offer was taken up in Alice Springs, Darwin and particularly in Tennant Creek.

The ARC discussed at length the issue of community of interest given that it had been raised many times in objections and other comments received. It was clear that the views on this matter were very wide. Some submitters identified indigenous language groups as a defining point, others felt it could represent a large geographic area with common interests and for urban areas it could represent a suburb or even part of a suburb.

In its deliberations the ARC took a wide view of community of interest and attempted as far as possible to keep these intact where identified. While a number of divisions could be seen to have several communities of interests, the ARC believes this is inevitable where large geographic areas are involved or rapid growth is occurring.

Before making its final decision on boundaries, the ARC considered the boundaries of each division against the requirements of sections 139 and 140 of the Act and formed the view that its final decision provided a reasonable balance of the redistribution objectives and matters to be considered, as required by the Act.

## 2 OBJECTIONS RECEIVED TO PROPOSAL

### 2.1 Objections Received

As noted above the Redistribution Committee Report and maps of the proposed boundaries were published on 24 April with a closing date for objections of 26 May 2008. By the closing date, the ARC had received 14 written objections, pursuant to section 145 of the Act, from the persons or organisations listed below:

Copies of the objections received by the ARC together with all suggestions and comments, are included in Volume 2 of this report entitled *Supporting Documentation on the 2008 Redistribution of the Northern Territory into Divisions*. Copies of the objections, suggestions and comments received are also reproduced on the NTEC website at [www.ntec.nt.gov.au](http://www.ntec.nt.gov.au) .

During and after the objection period the ARC also met with representatives of organisations and individuals in Darwin, Alice Springs and Tennant Creek. Whilst these meetings provided additional background to the ARC, they are not included as objections or comments if no written submission was received.

## 3 THE 2008 ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES

The ARC commenced its deliberations by examining the proposed divisions prepared by the RC in the light of updated enrolment data, written objections to the proposals and views expressed by electors and community organisations at consultations held in Tennant Creek, Alice Springs and at the Northern Territory Electoral Commission's office in Darwin.

Printed copies of the maps of new boundaries accompany this report and are also available at the NTEC website. Appendix C lists the Compiled Plans of the divisional boundaries and Appendix D lists the transfer of electors listed by Census Collection Districts (CCDs) between divisions arising from the redistribution.

### 3.1 Darwin CBD and Suburbs

Following the 2004 redistribution, the nine divisions located wholly within the Darwin municipal boundaries have collectively undergone a significant loss of electors relative to the quota.

The trend described in the RC's report of a relative decline in enrolment in the northern suburbs compared to those closer to the Darwin CBD was reinforced by the enrolment data extracted at 26 May 2008. The seven northern divisions continued to decline with a further 2.5% drop in enrolment relative to the quota, with two thirds of the decline occurring in the divisions of Millner and Johnston.

Changes in enrolment in the CBD and adjacent suburbs are harder to identify as the area includes parts of the divisions of Millner and Drysdale. However, an examination of enrolment by individual CCDs indicated that the inner suburbs are continuing to grow. The division of Fannie Bay for example had increased by almost 1% against the quota in the three months to 26 May 2008.

To address the over-quota in the Darwin CBD and the inner suburbs and to allow the division of Drysdale to be located wholly within the municipal boundaries of Palmerston, the RC proposed the transfer of electors from Port Darwin and Fannie Bay and the creation of the division of Fong Lim that would extend from the city to the edge of the northern suburbs and Palmerston.

In the northern suburbs, the RC proposed that the collective 49% under-quota required significant changes to the boundaries of the division of Millner and the consolidation of the remaining six divisions. The main features of the changes proposed by the RC were the provision of a negative buffer in the quota for Wanguri in anticipation of growth in the suburb of Lyons, the extension of Johnston across Rapid Creek to include the suburb of Millner and splits between divisions for the suburbs of Coconut Grove and Wagaman. The splits were required so that the divisions of Johnston and Sanderson could be maintained reasonably close to quota.

### 3.1.1 Darwin CBD and Inner Suburbs

The ARC received objections to the proposed redistribution of Port Darwin, Fannie Bay and the proposed new division of Fong Lim. The objections were examined in considerable detail but the ARC was not able to identify a better solution to the RC's proposal.

The ARC therefore determined that the RC proposal would remain, subject only to a variation on the basis of practicability that avoids splitting streets between divisions at the suburb boundary between Parap and Ludmilla. Under this change that part of Ludmilla contained by Calma Gardens, May Street and Hudson Fysh Avenue is transferred to the division of Fannie Bay.

The enrolment and quota of the three divisions are:

<b>Fannie Bay:</b>	4892 (2.6% over-quota)
<b>Fong Lim:</b>	4836 (1.5% over-quota)
<b>Port Darwin:</b>	4676 (1.9% under-quota)

### 3.1.2 Northern Suburbs

The ARC received four written objections relating to the proposed boundaries of the six northern suburbs divisions. These included two objections regarding the changes to the division of Millner.

The submissions concerned solely with the proposed changes to Millner were centred on the likely closing of the electorate office at Rapid Creek and the possibility that the existing sitting member would no longer represent the suburb of Millner. The ARC determined that these matters were outside the redistribution objects and considerations identified in the Act. These submissions and those relating to the division of Barkly (see below) highlight the difficulties that can arise when names of divisions are also the name of a suburb, a region or a local government area.

The ARC considered the remaining objections in detail. However, after exhaustively exploring the suggested alternatives, it found that each had consequential effects that produced outcomes inferior to those of the RC's proposal. The ARC also noted that the suburb of Millner remains intact within the division of Johnston.

In the light of the anticipated growth of the quota and with the relative lack of population growth in many areas of the northern suburbs, the ARC believes that the small over-quota for most of these divisions will be absorbed by the next redistribution and further adjustments may be necessary at that time.

The enrolment and quota of the six divisions are:

<b>Casuarina:</b>	4693 (1.5% under-quota)
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<b>Johnston:</b>	4919 (3.2% over-quota)
<b>Karama:</b>	4908 (3.0% over-quota)
<b>Nightcliff:</b>	4919 (3.2% over-quota)
<b>Sanderson:</b>	4843 (1.6% over-quota)
<b>Wanguri:</b>	4528 (5.0% under-quota)

### **3.2 Palmerston and Adjoining Rural Area**

The three divisions covering Palmerston (Blain, Brennan and Drysdale) and the two divisions covering the rural areas to the east and south (Nelson and Goyder) have grown significantly since the 2004 Redistribution. At 14 February 2008 the five divisions were collectively 45% above quota. Over the three months to 26 May 2008 growth continued at a level higher than the Territory average and resulted in the divisions being collectively 50% above quota.

#### **3.2.1 Palmerston Divisions**

In view of the level of over-quota and anticipated growth in the divisions of Blain, Brennan and Drysdale, the RC proposed that the three divisions be contained within the Palmerston municipality boundaries. To achieve this it proposed:

- the transfer of the westward extension of Drysdale beyond the municipal boundary to the new Darwin city based division of Fong Lim;
- the transfer of the suburbs of Marlow Lagoon and Archer into Drysdale from Goyder;
- the transfer of the Palmerston Indigenous Community into Brennan from Nelson; and
- internal adjustment to boundaries between Blain, Drysdale and Brennan were also made to bring each division closer to quota and account for community of interest, limits placed by main roads and anticipated areas of residential growth.

The proposal attracted two objections and the ARC visited the Palmerston area to gain a greater appreciation of the basis of these objections, particularly those relating to the apparent imbalances in the provision for anticipated growth in Blain and Brennan.

The ARC considered the RC's proposal in the light of further research on areas of likely residential growth in Palmerston to mid 2009 and accordingly amended the RC's proposal by including part of the suburb of Rosebery in the division of Blain.

The ARC determined that the initial proposal for the Palmerston divisions be unchanged other than for the adjustment to boundaries covering the suburb of Rosebery mentioned above.

It is likely that the pattern of growth will become clearer by the time of the next redistribution, but the ARC believes that adjustment to the current boundaries cannot be deferred until then as to do so increases the potential of quite significant changes to divisional boundaries at the time of the next redistribution.

The enrolment and quota of the three divisions are:

<b>Blain:</b>	4755 (0.2% under-quota)
<b>Brennan:</b>	4847 (1.7% over-quota)
<b>Drysdale:</b>	4682 (1.8% under-quota)

### 3.2.2 Nelson

The division of Nelson has grown rapidly since the 2004 redistribution to be 10.5% over-quota at 14 February 2008 and this growth has continued over the three months to 26 May 2008. The ARC believes this growth will continue for some time, given the ongoing land subdivision activity in the electorate.

To address the over-quota in Nelson, the RC proposed the transfer to Goyder of approximately 600 electors resident along the Arnhem Highway and the transfer of 100 electors within the Municipality of Darwin to the division of Karama. It also proposed the transfer of Gunn Point and Glyde Point to Nelson from Goyder as the small number of voters in this area are linked directly to the body of the Nelson division by the existing road network.

The ARC considered carefully the objections raised in respect of this division but could see no compelling reason to significantly change the RC's proposal. Of concern was the effect of not transferring to Goyder the significant over-quota in Nelson, with consequential effects on the boundaries of Daly and Stuart. To have left the southern boundary of Nelson unchanged would also have prevented an adjustment to the boundaries of the division of Katherine (see section 3.3 below).

Accordingly, the ARC confirmed the adjustment of boundaries for the division of Nelson as set out in the RC's proposal except for a minor adjustment that deleted an area of Nelson on the eastern side of Lee Point Road and transferred it into Wanguri. This transfer resulted in all of the Darwin based divisions being contained within the Darwin municipal boundaries with the exception of Fong Lim which includes the unincorporated area between the Darwin and Palmerston municipal boundaries.

Enrolment and quota:

<b>Nelson:</b>	4565 (4.2% under-quota)
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### 3.2.3 Goyder

The RC proposed that the western boundary of Goyder be aligned with the Elizabeth River and the Stuart Highway, with the transfer of Cox Peninsula to Daly partly balanced by transfers from Nelson. The proposal recognised the likelihood of continued strong growth in Goyder as the result of existing and proposed land subdivision.

The objections to the RC's proposal suggested much smaller transfers of electors both into and out of Goyder. The ARC considered carefully the objections but, for the reasons set out above in relation to Nelson, determined that the boundaries as proposed by the RC should remain.

Enrolment and quota:

**Goyder:** 4672 (2.0% under-quota)

### 3.3 Katherine

The RC noted that the division of Katherine experienced a drop in enrolment against the quota since the 2004 Redistribution and that an expansion of the division to take in all of the new municipal boundaries had merit. The expansion was supported in two suggestions and a subsequent comment but the RC did not proceed with the expansion due to the balance of numbers in the surrounding division.

With changes by the ARC to the division of Stuart (see 3.5.1 below) that have resulted in an increase in electors in that division, the ARC determined that the division of Katherine be expanded to take in the new Municipality of Katherine boundaries. This has the effect of transferring 157 electors into the division. The areas now added to the division are Edith Farms Road, the western extension of Florina Road, Charles Darwin University campus and areas to the south and south-east of Katherine along the Stuart Highway.

Enrolment and quota:

**Katherine:** 4883 (2.5% above quota)

### 3.4 Alice Springs

Since the 2004 redistribution, enrolment in the three Alice Springs divisions has declined collectively by 16% against the quota. To bring the divisions up to or near quota the RC proposed their boundaries be extended to the Alice Springs municipal boundaries. This adjustment resulted in the transfer of approximately 1000 electors enrolled in the town camps in Stuart and the rural subdivisions in Macdonnell into the Alice Springs divisions.

General support for the RC's proposal was expressed by a number of parties during discussions that were held with stakeholders in Alice Springs. The one

objection received suggested that only minor changes be made to the existing boundaries of Araluen, Braitling and Greatorex. Again, the ARC gave careful consideration to this objection but confirmed the boundaries for the Alice Springs divisions as proposed by the RC as best meeting the objects of the redistribution.

The ARC noted that unless there is significant growth within Alice Springs relative to the expected growth in quota it is likely that in future the boundaries of these divisions may need to extend beyond the municipality.

The enrolment and quota for the three Alice Springs divisions are:

<b>Araluen:</b>	4918 (3.2% over-quota)
<b>Braitling:</b>	4853 (1.8% over-quota)
<b>Greatorex:</b>	4808 (0.9% over-quota)

### 3.5 Remote Divisions

The seven remote divisions covering the northern coast, the Katherine Region, the Barkly Tableland and the Centre have experienced a modest increase of 2269 electors since the 2004 Redistribution. However this overall growth masks significant differences in enrolment growth between the various remote divisions.

In line with the trends noted with the more settled areas of the Territory, there has been a steady growth of elector numbers in the north. The northern divisions of Arafura, Arnhem, Daly and Nhulunbuy are over-quota and each has experienced an increase in elector numbers in excess of the Territory average, with Arnhem 7.9%, Daly 8.9% and Nhulunbuy 7.4% over-quota at 26 May 2008. By contrast the remote divisions of Macdonnell, Stuart and Barkly in the Centre are on average 9% below quota and declining relative to the quota.

The RC responded to this situation by examining the potential for the transfer of electors from the growing northern divisions to adjoining divisions lying to the south. Whilst this was possible in the case of Arnhem and Daly, it was not the case with Arafura due to its location. Transfers from Nhulunbuy are complicated by the geography of that region and the concentration of electors in the eastern Arnhem area.

The geographic size and remoteness of these divisions presented a considerable challenge to the RC and ARC in arriving at a solution that it believes results in a reasonable balance between the various objects of the redistribution and the matters that are required to be considered as part of a redistribution, particularly the issue of community of interest.

While outside the specific requirements of the ARC's considerations, it felt that the possibility of continued growth in the size of the southern and central divisions serviced from Alice Springs, Tennant Creek and Katherine warrants serious consideration of the support provided to local members and their ability to service the diverse community of interests and constituents in these large areas.

### **3.6 The Centre – Barkly, Macdonnell and Stuart**

The Centre has sufficient electors to support only two divisions south of the Barkly Highway and the Tanami Desert, yet this is the heartland of three existing divisions, with Stuart and Macdonnell centred on Alice Springs and Barkly on Tennant Creek.

The under-quota in the remote divisions in the Centre is exacerbated by the decline that has occurred in enrolment in the Alice Springs urban divisions relative to the rest of the Territory and to the quota. As noted above, the three divisions have had to be supplemented at this redistribution by the transfer from Stuart and Macdonnell of electors who reside within the Alice Springs town boundaries.

The RC proposed to address the decline in enrolment in the divisions in the Centre by combining the southern portions of Stuart and Barkly as a single division. The proposed new division of Buchanan in the north was oriented generally to Katherine and made up of electors from the top end of Barkly and Stuart and the over-quota present in Daly, Arnhem and indirectly Nhulunbuy.

The larger part of the objections to the RC proposal that were received, and those that were the most strongly argued, were lodged in respect of the proposal for these divisions. A total of nine written objections were received to the proposals for Barkly and Stuart. Some of the objections submitted alternative proposals such as the extension of the two divisions north to the Katherine region and the Roper River. The balance of the written objections related to the proposal in general terms by referring to the strong community of interest in the Barkly region, and particularly to the abolition of Barkly as a division name.

The ARC met with a range of community representatives at Tennant Creek on 15 May 2008. All representatives argued strongly in support of the retention of the division of Barkly centred on Tennant Creek and aligned roughly to the new shire boundaries. Written submissions were provided by a number of persons as part of their presentation to the meeting and these submissions were treated by the ARC as constituting formal objections.

Following a careful review of the objections received by the ARC and a further analysis of elector numbers as at 26 May 2008, the ARC determined that the division of Barkly should be retained and that Stuart be aligned to extend from north of Alice Springs to Pine Creek. The RC proposal for Macdonnell was confirmed by the ARC but with the addition of that part of Stuart immediately to the north of Alice Springs to provide a buffer above quota to meet anticipated declines in elector numbers to mid 2009.

A further written objection sought the inclusion of Alpururulam in the same division as the Utopia region on the ground that it would better recognise a community of interest centred on the Alyawarr language group. This objection could not be accommodated as the number of electors involved would have upset the number of electors in Macdonnell with significant flow-on effects to other divisions.

The ARC noted that in the absence of further enrolment growth in the Centre it is to be expected that the boundaries will continue to move northwards as part of future redistributions.

The enrolment and quota for the three divisions are:

<b>Barkly:</b>	4700 (1.4% under-quota)
<b>Macdonnell:</b>	4895 (2.7% above-quota)
<b>Stuart:</b>	4559 (4.3% under-quota)

### **3.6.1 The North - Arafura, Arnhem, Daly, Nhulunbuy**

The divisions of Arafura, Arnhem, Daly and Nhulunbuy were each over-quota at 26 May 2008, but there are indications that enrolment will remain stable or that future growth may be modest. In the case of Nhulunbuy it was also suggested to the RC that the current significant over-quota would decline in line with departure of construction workers from the town.

The RC decided that whilst it was not possible to predict demographic trends with any reliability in the northern divisions, changes to boundaries were required to reduce the general level of over-quota, to balance elector numbers and to allow the retention of a remote division to the south.

To give effect to this decision, the RC proposed that:

- the division of Daly shed Pine Creek and the area below the Fitzmaurice River to the proposed division of Buchanan and in the north extend to the Cox Peninsula, an area currently in Goyder;
- the area to the south of the Central Arnhem road in eastern Arnhem Land be transferred from Nhulunbuy to Arnhem; and
- the area south of the Roper Highway and the area to the east of Katherine (Beswick, Manyallaluk and Barunga) be transferred from Arnhem to the proposed division of Buchanhan.

The ARC received four objections to the RC's proposal for Daly, Arnhem and Nhulunbuy.

Two of the objections related to the proposed transfer of electors from Nhulunbuy on the ground that the proposal was contrary to the community of interest in the Laynhapuy Homelands in eastern Arnhem Land. After consideration, the ARC accepted the objection and amended the RC proposal by transferring the community of Gapuwiyak and surrounding area to the division of Arnhem. The ARC further amended the RC's proposal by aligning the southern boundary of the division of Arnhem to the Roper River, instead of the Roper Highway as proposed originally.

Following a careful assessment of the objections lodged covering Daly, Arnhem and Nhulunbuy and subject to the amendments that are described above, the ARC confirmed the RC proposal for the northern remote divisions.

The enrolment and quota of the four divisions are:

<b>Arafura:</b>	4952	(3.9% over-quota)
<b>Arnhem:</b>	4714	(1.1% under-quota)
<b>Daly:</b>	4643	(2.6% under-quota)
<b>Nhulunbuy:</b>	4493	(5.7% under-quota)

## 4 NAMES OF DIVISIONS

### 4.1 Proposed New Division Names

In accordance with section 139 of the Act, the RC proposed to rename the divisions of Barkly and Millner.

In the case of Barkly, the decision of the ARC to adopt a different set of boundaries to that originally proposed has obviated the need for a name change. However, the ARC noted the confusion that was evident from the creation of a new shire with the same name. While this situation also applies to the division of Macdonnell, the ARC did not consider that the wider public has had sufficient time to consider further name changes.

In the case of Millner, a change of name is required as the adjusted boundaries significantly alter the geographic spread of the division resulting in the suburb of Millner no longer being within the new boundaries. In accordance with the naming principles set out above, the RC proposed that the division be named Fong Lim and the ARC confirms this proposal.

As the RC noted, Mr Alec Fong Lim AM (1931-1990) gave a lifetime of public service to Darwin. A successful businessman and keen sportsman, he made a significant contribution through his involvement in community and charitable organisations. He was elected Mayor of Darwin in 1986 and made a Member of the Order of Australia in 1986 in recognition of his service to the community and to local government over many years.

### 4.2 Use of Locality Names for Divisions

The Legislative Assembly currently has 15 divisions that carry the name of a suburb or a geographical area or feature within their boundary. The use of a suburb name is becoming increasingly inappropriate for divisions in urban areas as they generally include at least two suburbs. Similarly, the use of geographical names for rural divisions is also problematical as these electorates will generally tend over time to become larger in order to maintain their enrolment against the quota.

The ARC therefore supports the suggestion that all geographic and location names be changed in favour of names of worthy contributors to the community for both philosophical and practical reasons. However, it is also felt that the selection of a significant number of new names is best addressed through wider public consultation and greater research than the RC or the ARC was able to afford at this time.

On that basis the ARC has restricted its renaming to the division of Millner and recommends that the Northern Territory Electoral Commission initiate wider consultation with the community and any necessary research into appropriate names before the next redistribution in an effort to compile an on-going list of names that may be used in the future. The ARC believes this list of names should also include indigenous and female Territorians who have made a contribution to the development of the Northern Territory.

## 5 PUBLICATION OF BOUNDARIES

### 5.1 Publication

In accordance with section 144 of the Act, the redistribution of boundaries was published by notice in the Gazette on 16 June 2008. This report has been provided to the Minister in accordance with section 148 of the Act.

This report is also made available for public inspection without fee in accordance with sections 147 and 149 of the Act. The report and maps of each division are available at the NTEC offices in Darwin and Alice Springs, the office of the Surveyor-General, Council offices in Darwin, Palmerston, Jabiru, Katherine, Tennant Creek and Alice Springs, the office of the Nhulunbuy Corporation Limited and all electorate offices of Members of the Legislative Assembly.

### 5.2 Acknowledgements

The Augmented Redistribution Committee and the Redistribution Committee gratefully acknowledge the assistance of staff in the Northern Territory Electoral Commission and the Department of Planning and Infrastructure in undertaking their work. The Committees are also grateful for the time and effort put in by many members of the public and other interested groups who made written and oral submissions to assist the 2008 redistribution process.

### 5.3 Dissolution of the Augmented Redistribution Committee

In accordance with section 340 of the Act, the Augmented Redistribution Committee is now dissolved.
