RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF SCRUTINEERS

Candidates can appoint persons to represent them at a voting centre and/or counting centre.

Voting centres

Only one scrutineer per candidate is allowed in the voting centre during voting.

While you are in the voting centre, you **CAN**

- **Watch all procedures including a voting official helping an elector to mark their ballot paper/s**
- **Object to the right of a person to vote.** Your objection will be noted, although the Officer in Charge (OIC) may still allow the person to vote
- **Enter and leave the voting centre at any time.** Note: another appointed scrutineer may replace you.

You **CANNOT**

- Touch the ballot papers
- Interfere with, or attempt to influence the vote of any elector in the voting centre
- Wear or show campaign emblems, t-shirts, or similar, inside the voting centre
- Show, hand out or leave 'How-to-Vote' material in the voting centre
- Go near the voting compartments except to watch while a voter is being helped to mark his/her ballot paper
- Communicate with any person in a voting centre other than in the exercise of your functions as a scrutineer
- Help with tidying the voting centre or removing material.
- Reveal anything you know about how an elector voted.

Please discuss any queries or objections about procedures with the Officer in Charge. Do not talk to voting staff, as they must concentrate on their own duties.

You must respond to any lawful direction from the Officer in Charge. Runners cannot come into the voting centre and campaign workers can enter once – in order to vote.

Scrutiny and count

One scrutineer per candidate per count table is allowed at the count.

Unless advised to the contrary, two count tables will be in operation in voting centres/counting centres for the purposes of this entitlement.

Again, discuss any queries or objections about procedures with the Officer in Charge. Please do not talk to counting staff, as they must concentrate on their own duties.

Note: Turn off /switch to silent your mobile phone before entering the voting/counting centre.

BALLOT PAPER FORMALITY

A ballot paper is formal provided the order of preference and the voter's intention is clear.

Alterations made by the elector to numbering, numbers written outside the squares, drawings and slogans do not make the ballot paper informal, provided the voter's preferences are clear.

In accordance with the *Electoral Act* a cross (X) or a tick (✓) or the figure one (1) may be taken to be the first preference of a voter. A ballot paper is **informal** if:

- Any ballot paper with no marking on it
- Any ballot paper where there is no figure one (1) or a cross (X) or a tick (✓)
- Any ballot paper where the number one (1), a cross (X) or a tick (✓) appear against two or more names
- Any ballot paper where the electors intention is not clear
- Any ballot paper with a mark or writing that identifies the elector
